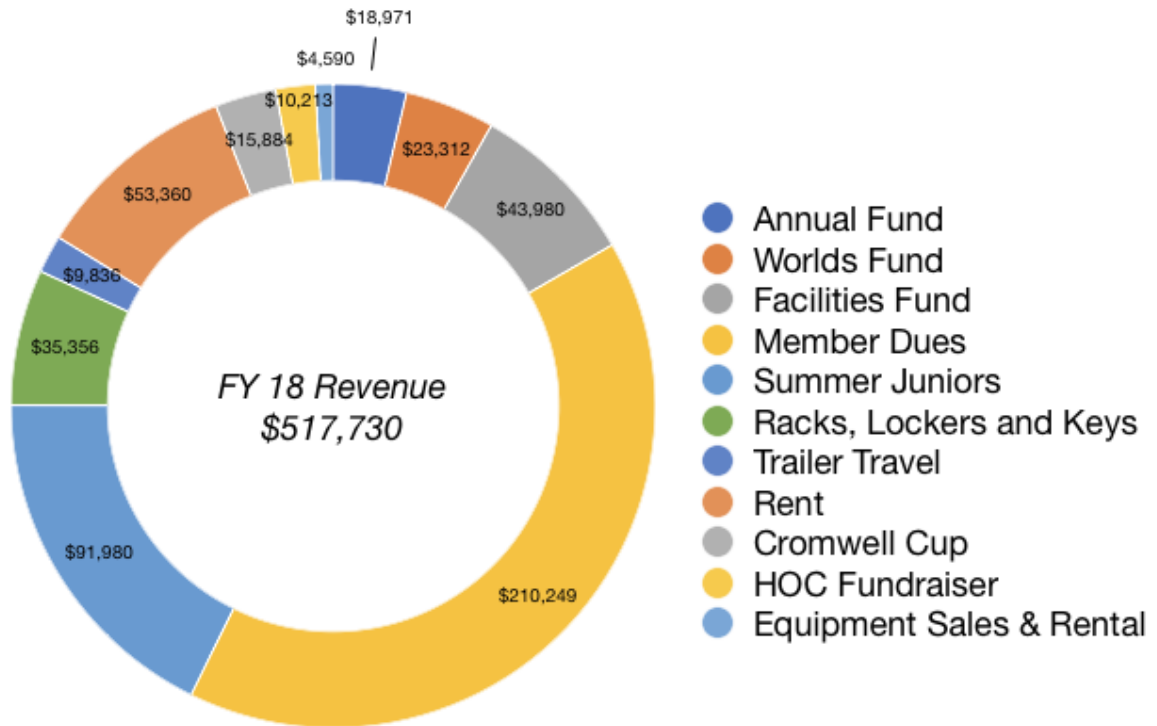

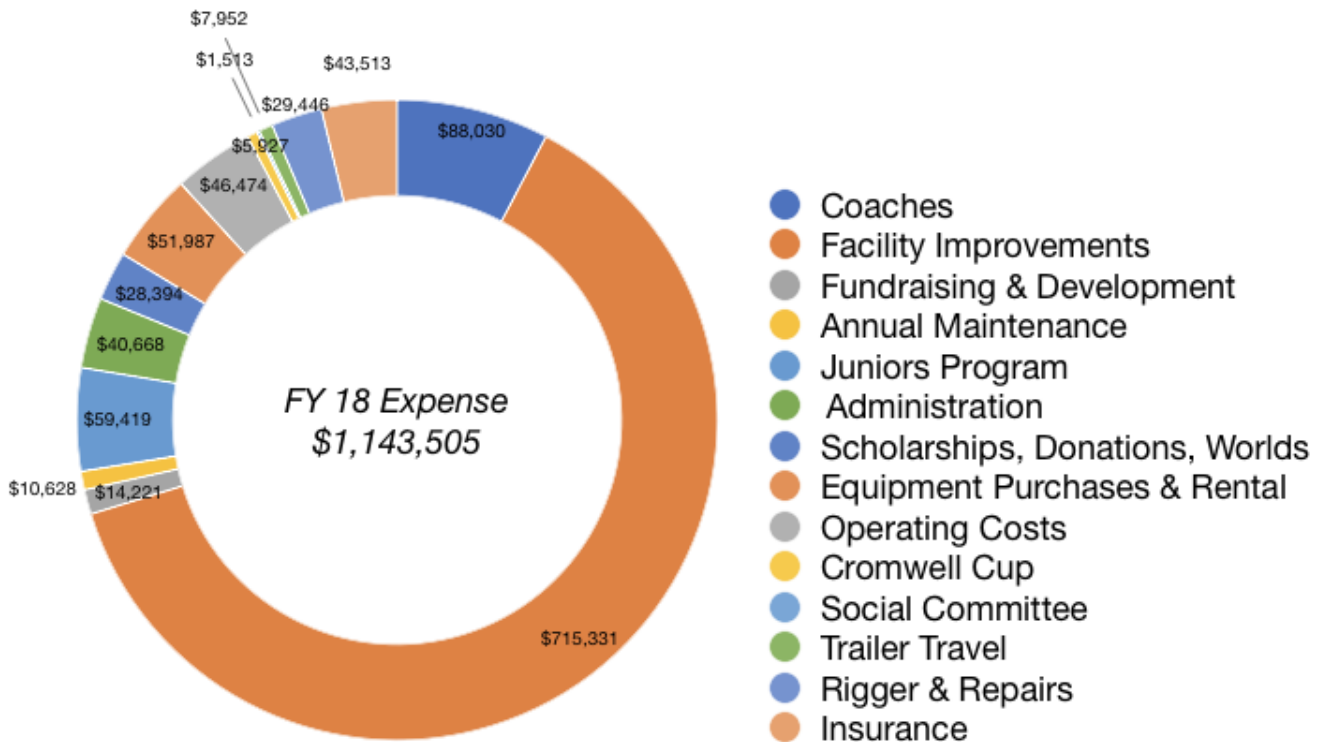

VOLUNTEER REPORT

2018

Service is a critical part of Riverside Boat Club's past, present and future. Riverside Boat Club is a volunteer-run organization. In 2018, members collectively logged over 7000 hours of service to support and maintain the club, in addition to the hundreds of volunteer hours our board of directors invests each year. Volunteers engaged in maintaining and upgrading the building and docks, taking care of the driveway, walkways, lawn and garden and maintaining the Riverside fleet of club boats. Members donated time to fundraise for the Riverside annual fund, plan and host social and community events, manage the Riverside newsletter and social media, and contribute to the Charles River and Cambridgeport communities.

One of Riverside's largest volunteer events of each year is hosting the Cromwell Cup Regatta, a 1000m race held in the powerhouse every July. This year, 38 clubs travelled to Cambridge from as far as Wisconsin to participate in the event. Riverside volunteers also participate in supporting the Head of the Charles, as well as the Head of the Q, a youth only sculling race that provides an opportunity for 140 juniors to race a single.



In addition to volunteering their time to the club and the Charles River rowing community, Riverside members are actively engaged in community affairs: members devoted over two hundred hours this year volunteering in neighborhood-supporting activities. A number of members live in Cambridgeport, and members participate in the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association (CNA) leadership. Regardless of residency, many club members are actively involved in the neighborhood's larger initiative to revitalize the parkland between the Magazine Beach playing fields and the boathouse. The club organized members to participate in multiple Charles River Cleanups, attend Magazine Beach work parties, and to help set up and attend CNA events.

LANDSCAPE MAINTENANCE AND B&G

Landscape Maintenance for DCR

The Building and Grounds Committee had over 25 work parties in 2018, with over 200 participating in total and thousands of volunteer hours logged. Outdoor projects included extensive lawn rehabilitation of the grounds after the construction efforts, heavy clean-up of annual debris from the adjacent park events and passersby, as well as the annual tree, lawn, and shoreline maintenance. In all these efforts, we retained strong participation by both senior and provisional members, at the ground level, so to speak. These efforts underscore a membership that continues to take stewardship of RBC's spot on the river very seriously, a continuing pride in RBC's standards of excellence and responsibility.



RBC Building & Grounds

2018 was a demanding but successful year for our volunteer efforts on the boathouse. In conjunction with the substantial construction projects undertaken with contractors and our dock vendor, RBC was able to leverage its volunteer base to deliver literally tens of thousands of dollars of labor and carpentry work for building improvements.

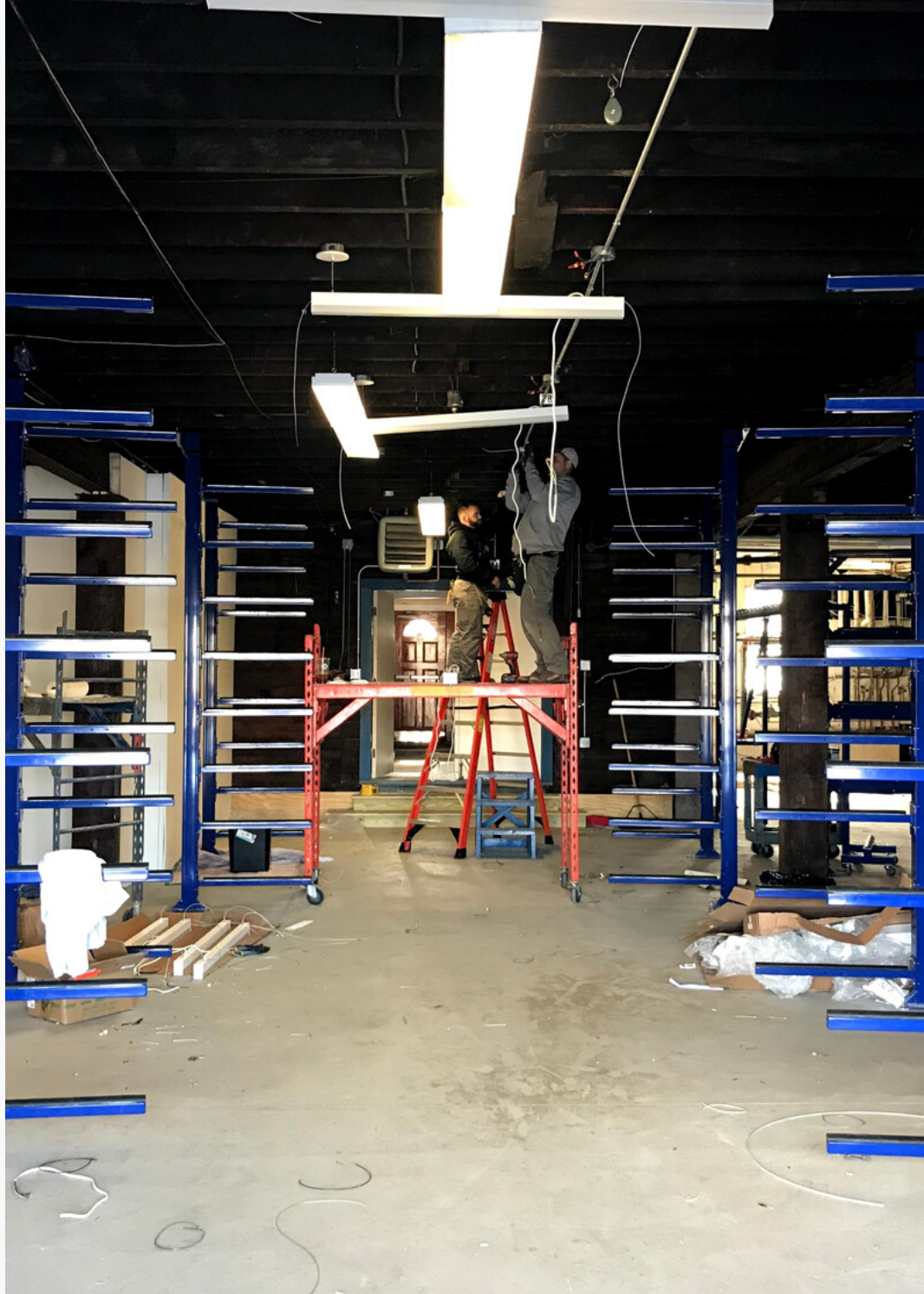
During the first 6 months, volunteer teams worked extensively both in committees and on the job preparing for the new docks that were installed by Eastern Seaboard and Row America. This required many evenings of committee phone calls, logistics discussions, and permitting submissions both in 2017 and 2018. The new docks provide RBC with a new platform and better use of space for RBC to flex to meet our growing membership and programming requirements for now and the future.

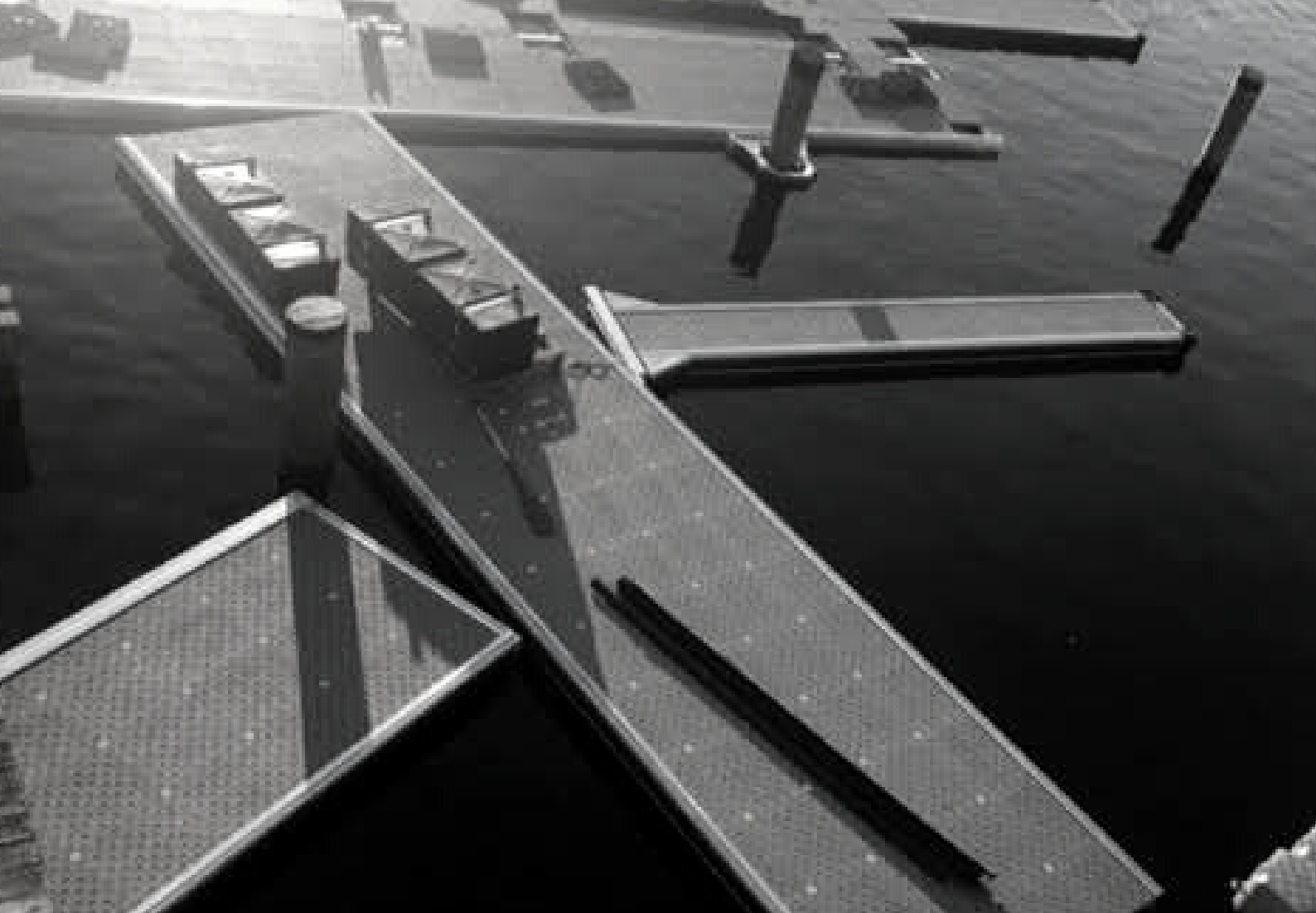
The boathouse interiors, namely the boat bays, were also a major focus of efforts in 2018. The volunteer teams were able to plan and execute on complete finish work for the 8's bay (wall insulation, drywall, and painting) as well as drywall work in the adjacent bays. This required literally

hundreds of hours of coordinated painters, carpenters, and insulation leads to complete the jobs in a short amount of time.

All of these projects also enabled RBC to make a dramatic overhaul of how it best optimizes its usage of space. Both inside the boathouse and on the back porches and outside adjacent areas - RBC is now more able to more efficiently enable program equipment (e.g. updated oar cabinets) to be used and stored. With our partners BC High and Simmons College, we were also able to formalize spaces dedicated to their programs and equipment. All these projects in tandem with the restoration work required a substantial coordination of volunteer labor, materials, and expertise. Projects that "go deep" such as what RBC took on in 2018 involved sorting and removing literally decades of outdated materials as well as refresh of functional areas. Several projects during the summer months required both weekday and weekend efforts over many days -- many hands made lighter work for sure. RBC should be proud of the end results; enhanced infrastructure, smarter use of space, and more energy efficiency which will pay rewards over the long term.







SERVICE AND COMMUNITY REPORT

Charles River Cleanup

Riverside Boat Club participates annually in the Charles River Conservancy Earth Day Cleanup in partnership with the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association. More than twenty club volunteers helped pick up trash along the Cambridge shore between the BU Bridge and River Street Bridge. Riverside has been volunteering at this annual event for more than 20 years.

Cambridgeport Neighborhood

Riverside designates a member residing in neighborhood to represent it to the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association. In this capacity, in 2018 our representative kept the association informed of activities at the boathouse, including regattas and boathouse repair work, and coordinated our contributions to its annual fundraiser, such as arranging for the club's chairs and tables to be set up at the powder house.



Magazine Beach

The club is an enthusiastic participant in the neighborhood's program, in collaboration with the Department of Communities and Recreation and the City of Cambridge, to restore Magazine Beach Park and its historic powder house. To that end the club committed \$1,000 toward DCR's first contract for the park's reconstruction, to be let in 2019. A Riverside representative is a founding board member of Magazine Beach Partners, the 501C3 non-profit organization formed by the neighborhood association to advise DCR and the City of Cambridge on the park's restoration.

Head of the Q

The Head of the Quinobequin is a juniors-only, singles only, head race that takes place on the Charles River the Sunday before Head of the Charles Regatta. (Quinobequin is a Native American name for the Charles River.) A 3,200m race, it begins at the Eliot Bridge and ends at the North Beach Street Bridge. Riverside's Juniors have participated since its inauguration in 2014. Conducting the regatta involves organizing the logistics of getting 100+ juniors in singles safely through the race course. Its race committee, made up of representatives from Riverside, Union, CBC and CRI, is a collaborative effort among the Charles River rowing organization. This year, RBC again served as co-host to the regatta.



HPG UPDATE

The High Performance Group and Riverside experienced a tremendous surge of energy and growth over the past calendar year. In the summer of 2018 we had notable performances in the Women's lightweight double, Women's lightweight quad, Men's openweight single, and the Men's lightweight quad. Of these boats, Jillian Zieff, Jen Sager, and Hillary Saeger made it to finals at the World Championship in Bulgaria and finished second, second, and fourth respectively. Following our competitive season, the HPG had a coaching transition that sought the onboarding of Evans Liolin. During this time, Riverside's HPG grew to host roughly twenty active members: eleven lightweight men, six lightweight women, and three openweight men. It is upon this foundation that Riverside's HPG found success at the Head of the Charles Regatta (4th W2x, 8th M2x, 4th M1x) in October and success at the Fall Speed Order (7th and 9th in LWT1x) in November. The winter training schedule ensued shortly after the Fall Speed Order and with it, sights for victory in the spring trial periods. We currently have ten members training for NSRI's in April with the rest of the squad building speed in the doubles for NSRII's in May. With the coaching of Evans Liolin being a temporary fill, Riverside's HPG is in the process of bringing on a more sustainable coaching solution. Current developments have been made concerning the hire of Mark Grinberg to become HPG's standing head coach. With the trials period about to start in a few weeks and the summer season around the corner, Riverside's HPG is training twelve times a week to ensure fast times and tough competition. We expect to see some exciting races over the upcoming months.

JUNIORS UPDATE

2018 saw the inaugural year of the RBC Jr. Stripes program, a rebirth of the competitive summer juniors program here at the boathouse. Directed by Amelia Patton and coached by Graeme Calloway, Cian Noone, and Jeff Schaffer, the program welcomed eight girls and fifteen boys from eight local programs to train and race boats from the single to the eight. Training seven practices each week in the middle of the day, the group experimented with all boat classes and lots of lineups over the seven-week season. The culmination of the summer was a week of racing at Canadian Henley.

The team raced almost every juniors event in Canada. For some athletes, it was a chance to test themselves in boats they had been training in all summer, while other athletes stepped out of their comfort zone and surprised themselves with great races in untested lineups. Whatever the race, and whatever the result, it was great to see the kids support each other all the way down the course. Everyone had a blast, on and off the water, and the team capped off the trip with a visit to Niagara Falls before heading home to Boston.

In 2019, we welcome back our 2018 coaching staff with the addition of current HPG-er Hannah Elder, and plan to expand the program to 28 athletes.

MASTERS UPDATE

The Masters are a team of men and women, ranging in age from the late 20s to 70s. We welcome skilled, competitive rowers and coxswains to participate in local, regional, national and international regattas. We focus on sweep rowing, but we also practice and compete in sculling. Most of us work out regularly with the team 3-4 times a week, but we also welcome members of the broader RBC family and coaching staff to join us for practice and regattas. Big events like World Masters and Head of the Charles often pull in a few alumni to fill out our most competitive boats. The team was coached in 2018 by Cian Noone and Karen Chenausky.

The women kicked off the year well represented at the Crash-B's and then at the Heineken Regatta in Amsterdam, placing 4th in the coxed quad. Sprint season brought our teams to Derby Sweeps & Sculls, Festival, Masters Regionals, and Cromwell Cup; the team medaled in all of these regional events. We capped off the summer season at Canadian Henley, and then at World Masters in Sarasota where we joined forces with some RBC alumni and Potomac Boat Club members for four days of racing. The women's team came in 8th out of about 140 clubs represented at Worlds, and the men came in 14th out of 230 clubs.

We transitioned to the Head season with the HOK series, defending our dominance at the CRI classic, and wrapped with the Head of the Charles where we fielded 7 boats plus 2 mixed Director's Challenge 8's which finished 2nd and 12th on an awful windy day. Six of the 7 crews earned guaranteed entries for 2019.

OPEN WOMEN'S SWEEP

The Open women's sweep team trains in both sweep and sculling boats for open and intermediate races at the local, regional and national level. They are coached by Nikolay Kurmakov. This year's squad was more close knit, with about 16 consistent year-round members and 9 U23 rowers in the summer. This year, the team competed at the Independence Day Regatta, Cromwell Cup, Club Nationals, Canadian Henley, Heads of the Kevin, and the Head of the Charles (see results below). Women's sweep looks forward to another year of competitive racing with local sweep women's programs and newer sweep women's programs in the northeast/mid-Atlantic region. Women's sweep set goals for the 2019 year of getting more of our members captain's tested, and having more of our members more involved in committees and volunteer tasks.

OPEN MEN'S SWEEP

Last fall we said goodbye to Jeff “El Jefe” Forrester following our wildly successful HOCR53. The search for a new coach concluded with the hiring of Tom Guncik, coming to us after several years at GW. Before that, Tom learned to row at Ohio State, and began his coaching career as an assistant at Bates College. Tom brought a great technical knowledge to our squad, as well as enthusiasm for side by side racing.

In June, our U23 program rowers joined our squad, bringing our numbers up to around 24 active members. We quickly bonded together, blending the U23 and senior teams together in practice, on the Harvard Stadium, and on the race course. We raced at Festival, IDR, Cromwell, and Club Nationals before shipping our U23s to St. Catherine’s for the Canadian Henley. IDR and Club Nationals both brought sweltering heat and extensive racing experience for every athlete. Rowers doubled, tripled, and some even quadrupled up between different events. The Rex brothers, Peter and Liam, were a major inspiration, racing the pair quite well at IDR, club nationals, and Canadian Henley on top of 4s and 8s. Summer race results are highlighted below.

Open Men’s Sweeps entered the fall hungry for victory the Charles with last year’s success in mind. Numerous days of seat racing and solid performances at the HOKs gave confidence to the crew despite being able to get a break from the unrelenting wind in October.

Miraculously, the wind died down on race day, and the Club 8+ charged into a 4th place overall finish and the 4th consecutive club medal win, only 15 seconds behind first place.

Both 4s finished top half in order to guarantee entries for next year.

After another successful HOCR weekend, we continued to practice on the water, particularly focused on the trademarked Meatwagon Small Boat Bonanzas, until the weather indicated it was time for the indoor season. Heading into 2019, the team elected Harris Fisher and Andy McLaughlin as the new captains. We’re eager for the upcoming summer racing season, targeting Canadian Henley as the major event with our U23s, but all eyes are on HOCR55 for solidifying club 8+ dominance and retaking the club 4+ medal.

SCULLING UPDATE

2018 was another great year for the sculling program at RBC. The season began with Karen Chenausky once again providing superb coaching to the morning sculling groups that were well attended with Cian Noone giving skill developing drills during the looping sessions on Thursdays. When Karen and Cian were called away due to work demands, Liane Keister and Lauren Ayers took over and did a great job preparing us for the fall season of races.

There were lots of highlights of our scullers doing well in regattas. (Our sweep rowers were also doing very well but the results listed below are just the sculling events.) The season started off with the Derby Sweeps and Sculls, always a fun regatta as we picnic by the side of the river while watching our teammates compete. All the masters events were handicapped and grouped in heats according to age. Sam Batchelor and Rudy Schreiber won the Mens Masters 2X, Carrie Main and Sean Wolf came in second in the masters mixed doubles, and Carrie and Anita Verheul also second place in women's masters 2X, Catherine Widgery won the women's masters 1X.

Next up was Cromwell cup where there were a lot of very close races for our scullers. Both the teams of Mike Bannister and Ernest Cook and that of Christine Higgins and Catherine Widgery each lost by only one second in the 2X. Andy Obrien won the Mens Masters E1X and Catherine Widgery won the Womens Master G1X, posting a time faster than the winning times in both the E and the F categories.

Northeast/Mid-Atlantic Masters was another fun team outing on a beautiful day in Lowell along the Merrimack. Sean Wolf won the Mens Masters Ltwt AA-D 1X, Catherine Widgery won the Womens Master G 1X, Andy Obrien won a silver medal in the Mens Masters E1X (losing by less than two seconds). Sean Wolf won a silver in the AA-B 1X losing by less than a second. Womens Masters D4X won a bronze. John Yasaitis and Ernest Cook won the F-K 2X with the fastest raw time against younger crews. Mike Bannister and Andy O'brien won silvers in the E 2X losing by less than a second to the gold medal crew. Catherine Widgery rowing with Laura Stirton Aust won the Womens Masters F 2X.

EuroMasters in Munich was a good regatta for Catherine Widgery where she won 6 golds. The sculling wins were the F 4X, G 4X.

Canadian Henley: Christine Higgins and Dani Dewitt came in second in the AA-D LTW 2X
US Masters Nationals in Oakland, CA had only one person from Riverside this year. Catherine Widgery won the G 1X, F 4X, G 2X, with a silver in the mixed G 4X and a bronze in the F 2X.

SCULLING UPDATE

World Masters in a sweltering hot Sarasota, FL in September had a lot of very fast crews competing. Tough conditions all around though great fun as long as you could find a way to cool down. A big crew from RBC and some heartbreakingly close races. In sculling boats, Catherine Widgery won the G 1X, F 4X.

Green Mountain Head that took place at the same time as the World Masters had some great results for Riverside. Kevin Meador won the Mens 19-34 1X and Alex Brown came in 5th in that event. Mike Farry came in 4th in the 35-44 1X. Jim McGaffigan came in second in the 45-54 category. Jillian Zieff came in 5th and Hilary Seager came in 6th just 5 seconds apart in the 19-34 category. Bryna McConarty came in 3rd in the 35-44 category. In the Mixed Open 2X Jillian Zieff and Kevin Meador came in 2nd.

CRI Fall Classic was once again this year a fun regatta as we wind our way up the course through stretches normally not used for racing. Older rowers compete against much younger ones with an age handicap. Ernest Cook and Mike Klinker won the Masters 2X beating all but one of the teams in raw time despite being one of the older ones on the course. Sean Wolf came in second in the Mens Masters 1X behind Carlo Zezza with his close to 5 minute handicap. Catherine Widgery won the Womens Masters 1X posting the fastest raw time though she was one of the oldest in the field.

Head of the Charles was as always a thrill and challenge. Riverside did well even if we didn't win the point trophy this year as we had in the past two years. Catherine Widgery won the Vet II category in her single. Jim McGaffigan came in second in the Mens Grand Masters just five seconds behind the unbeatable Greg Benning. Catherine and Jim were also in the RBC mixed 'great 8' that once again came in 2nd in the mixed 8+ category just 3 seconds behind the winning team who chased them up the course with loud speakers blaring. Jim will be much missed in so many ways. Also, in that mixed 8+ was Andy Hashway, Ilana Zieff, Alexis Sneff Belakovskiy, Nikolay Kurmakov, Tina Vandersteel and Matt Schonewald. Tina and Alexis won the amazingly fast race for the Women Masters 2X (40+) with Sara White and Ashley Lanfer coming in 2nd just a couple of seconds behind. Sean Wolf and Pete Morreli won the Mens Masters 2X (40+). Tom Keister and Igor Belakovskiy came in 5th in the big field of Masters Doubles. In the Mens Masters (30+) 1X, Jacob Georgeson came in 3rd and Andrew Hashway 4th. In the Womens Club 1X, Ilana Zieff came in 6th earning a guaranteed entry for this year. In the Womens Championship 2X, Hillary Saeger and Jillian Zieff came in 4th. Kevin Meador came in 4th in the Mens Championship 1X four seconds ahead of Mahe Drysdale among other storied Olympians who weren't quite as fast that day as Kevin. Kevin joined Joe Hanna, Brendan Harrington and Sam Hausmann in the Directors Challenge quad finishing 4th. Lauren Ayers finished 4th in the Lightweight Championship single against very stiff international competition.
