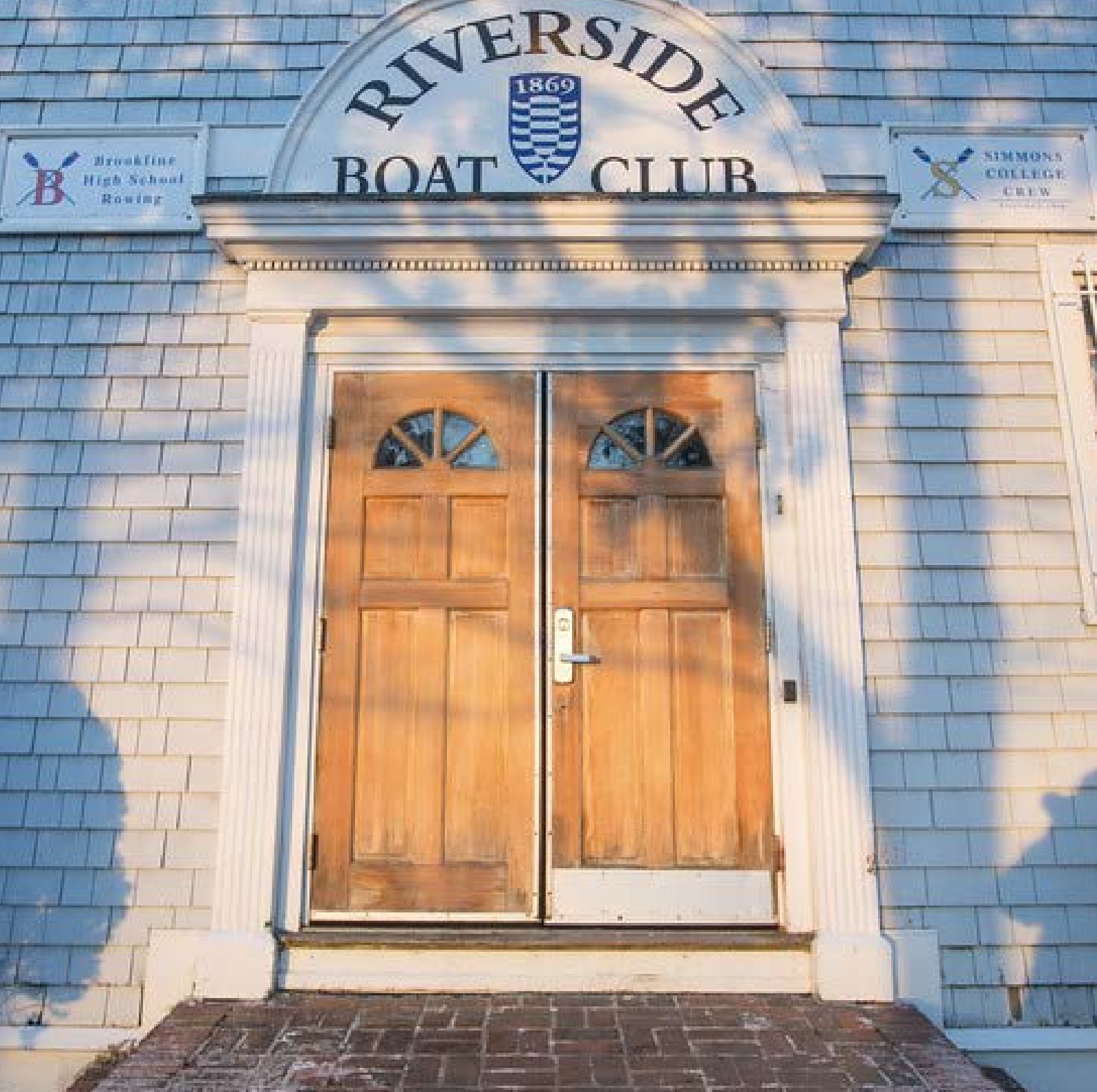

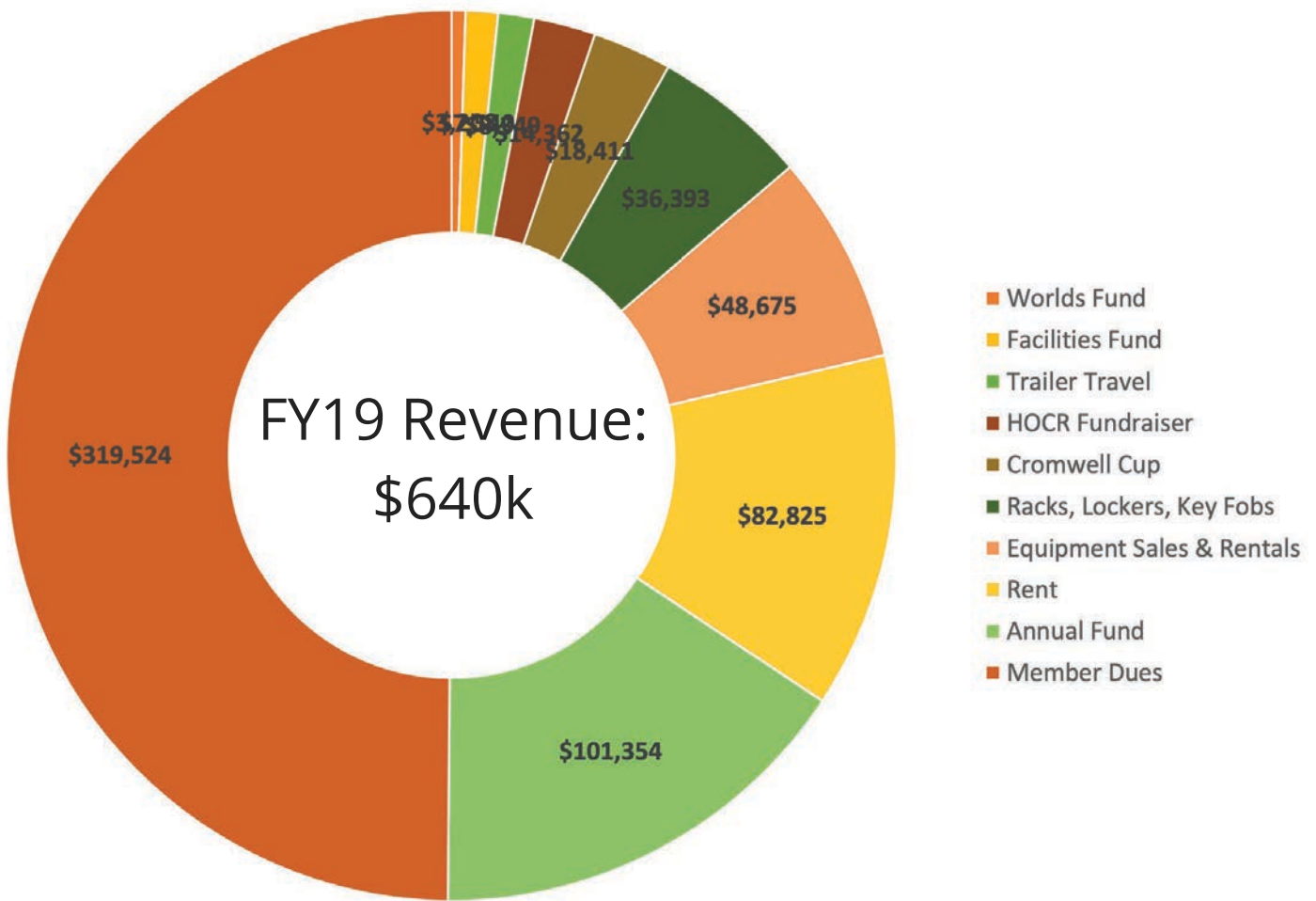

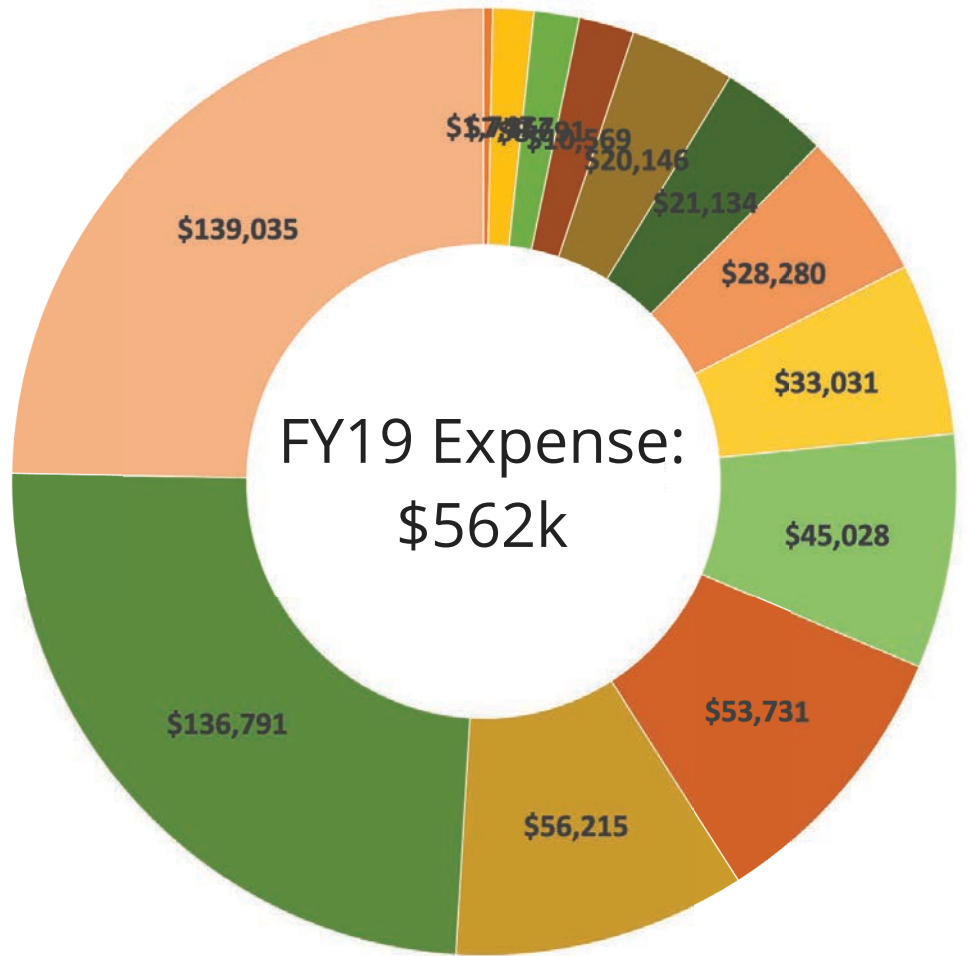

Charles River Cleanup

As is tradition, Riverside Boat Club is a consistent presence in the Charles River Conservancy Earth Day Cleanup hosted by the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association. Dozens of club volunteers helped pick up trash as they have in years past. In addition, BC High rowers helped cut back willows that had grown out of control on the shoreline.

Magazine Beach Partners

Since the Powder House was not quite ready in time, Riverside offered to host Magazine Beach Partner's annual fundraiser in September. High Performance Group members converted the boat bays and dock into a festive space. The Cambridge City Manager and our state congressman praised the cooperation of Riverside Boat Club, Magazine Beach Partners and the Department of Conservation and Recreation. A live band entertained over fifty guests from the community in celebration of the incredible transformation of Magazine Beach.

Head of the Q

Riverside juniors continued their annual participation in the Head of the Quinobequin, a juniors-only singles head race from Eliot Bridge to North Beach Street Bridge. As it has since the first "Head of the Q" in 2014, Riverside maintained a presence on the race committee and served as co-host of the regatta.

Hosting MIT

As MIT Rowing began gearing up for its boathouse renovation, Riverside Boat Club helped brainstorm ways to help MIT stay on the water. The Club offered to host MIT racks in the Magazine Beach parking lot.

Local governance

Members represented Riverside at various levels of government and local organizations. Representatives from the club kept abreast of developments and maintained good relationships with the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association, the City of Cambridge Pedestrian Committee, the Charles River Alliance of Boaters and the I-90 Allston Project.

Service is a critical part of Riverside Boat Club's past, present and future. Riverside Boat Club is a volunteer-run organization. In 2019, members collectively logged over 6000 hours of service to support and maintain the club, in addition to the hundreds of volunteer hours our board of directors invests each year. Volunteers engaged in maintaining and upgrading the building and docks, taking care of the driveway, walkways, lawn and garden and maintaining the Riverside fleet of club boats. Members donated time to fundraise for the Riverside annual fund, plan and host social and community events, manage the Riverside newsletter and social media, and contribute to the Charles River and Cambridgeport communities.

One of Riverside's largest volunteer events of each year is hosting the Cromwell Cup Regatta, a 1000m race held in the powerhouse every July. This year, 31 clubs travelled to Cambridge from as far as Greenwich, CT and London UK to participate in the event. Riverside volunteers also participate in supporting the Head of the Charles, as well as the Head of the Q, a youth only sculling race that provides an opportunity for 143 juniors to race a single.

In addition to volunteering their time to the club and the Charles River rowing community, Riverside members are actively engaged in community affairs: members devoted over two hundred hours this year volunteering in neighborhood-supporting activities. A number of members live in Cambridgeport, and members participate in the Cambridgeport Neighborhood Association (CNA) leadership. Regardless of residency, many club members are actively involved in the neighborhood's larger initiative to revitalize the parkland between the Magazine Beach playing fields and the boathouse. The club organized members to participate in multiple Charles River Cleanups, attend Magazine Beach work parties, and to help set up and attend CNA events.



SUMMER JUNIORS

2019 was the second year of the renewed RBC Juniors Summer Program. Coaches Graeme Calloway and Cian Noone returned with the support of new coach Hannah Elder. With a roster of just about twenty athletes, we had a lot of returners from the previous year, which provided an awesome opportunity for athletes to continue building on their foundational small boat skills. We ran practice five days a week, with two double sessions per week, for a total of five sessions. Athletes trained and raced in all boat classes from singles to eights and competed at Cromwell Cup and Canadian Henley.

Competitively, the team improved standings over the 2018 summer. We won the illustrious, and much sought after, Cromwell Gold at Cromwell Cup early on in the season, and Canadian Henley saw a lot of our boats move much farther up in the racing progression than the previous year. A particular success was our men's U19 2- who, working closely with Coach Noone, put up a spectacular performance and made the final where they finished 6th overall in a very fast event.



The 2020 season will be headed up by current HPG coach Mark Grinberg. Hannah Elder will be staying on to support him in the role of assistant coach. The program, and the athletes, are incredibly excited to have Mark and Hannah's coaching expertise as a resource and there is no doubt that the team will be setting new standards of boat speed going forward. We're looking forward to more rowing, more racing, and more winning for the Summer Junior's team and their coaches next season!

HIGH PERFORMANCE GROUP

In March of 2019, Mark Grinberg joined Riverside leading at the helm of the High Performance Group (HPG). With Mark's arrival, HPG has taken flight and many accomplishments both on and off the water. At Trials 3 in July, Alex Twist, Margaret Bertasi, Max Marchiony (U23), and Colin Hay (U23) qualified for the World Championships. Max and Colin went on to place 6th at U23 Worlds. At Senior Worlds, Alex and his partner placed 7th, and Margaret walked away from Linz a world champion. Other summer racing included Canadian Henley in St. Catherine's, Ontario. HPG raked in a total of five Henley Golds. These included:

Heading into the fall, the team turned their focus towards Head of the Charles and Fall Speed order. At HOOCR, Sam Hausmann, Joe Hanna and Jillian Zieff, Hillary Saeger collected wins respectively in both the men's and women's championships lightweight doubles.

At Fall Speed Order, members of HPG saw improvements from their results of the previous year and multiple personal best performances on the erg. A total of twelve athletes competed at the event highlighted by Jillian Zieff's win on the erg and water in the lightweight women's category. The dedication and drive to improve has not wavered. The group continues to train with full fervor and look forward to showing the national and international stage what they can accomplish.





MASTERS MEN AND WOMEN

The Masters are a team of men and women, ranging in age from the late 20s to 70s, who were coached in 2019 by head coach Jessica Smith, with Holly Metcalf and Sonia Witte providing additional coaching support.

We welcome skilled, competitive rowers and coxswains to participate in local, regional, national and international regattas. We focus on sweep rowing, but we also practice and compete in sculling. Most of us work out regularly with the team 3-4 times a week, but we also welcome members of the broader RBC family and coaching staff to join us for practices and regattas. Big events like World Masters and Head of the Charles often pull in a few alumni to fill out our most competitive boats.

Sprint season brought our teams to Festival and Cromwell Cup; the team medaled in these regional events. We capped off the summer season at Masters Nationals, qualifying for finals in most events and winning medals in five (one gold, four silver) before the remaining races were canceled due to weather.

We transitioned to the Head season with the HOK series, defending our dominance at the CRI classic, and wrapped up with the Head of the Charles, where we fielded six boats plus two mixed Director's Challenge 8's which finished 4th and 16th in a fun weekend of racing. Four of the six crews earned guaranteed entries for 2020.

WOMEN'S SWEEP



The Open Women's Sweep team trains in both sweep and sculling boats for open and intermediate races at the local, regional, and national level. They are coached by Nikolay Kurmakov. The team is always grateful for Nik's continuing knowledge, dedication, and support.

The 2019 team was comprised of about 14 consistent full-time members who were committed to building speed on the erg and in team boats throughout the year. During the summer, an additional nine U23 athletes joined the team. The 2019 U23 women were energetic, caring, competitive, and respectful. They made an excellent addition to the program and the boathouse.

This year, the team competed at Independence Day Regatta, Cromwell Cup, Canadian Henley, Heads of the Kevin, and Head of the Charles (see results below). In 2019, the team focused on consistency and commitment in training, which ultimately paid off in a competitive Head of the Charles race.

MEN'S SWEEP: MEATWAGON 2019

The Darkest Timeline

The 2019 season for Men's Sweeps began with the usual Spring season shenanigans, taking to the water after a dedicated winter training. We hired Andy Sayles, the Head Novice Boys Coach at CRI, and began coached practices in the beginning of June. Right around the same time our summer U23 squad started to arrive. By mid-June, we were in full swing with a new coach and a full roster.

The summer racing cycle began with a scrimmage against Potomac, hosted in DC. The senior and U23 team joined forces in Philly for the Independence Day Regatta, resulting in a big win in the Senior 8+ category. Shout out to Rob McNamara for being a senior leader and getting dragged up and down the course by the U23s numerous times. Momentum continued through Cromwell Cup with some fierce intra-team competition—including three 8s in the final. We opted to pass on Club Nationals this year, given that it was held in Ohio, focusing our efforts on Canadian Henley instead. We sent a mixed group of senior and U23 guys north, with both senior and U23 8s making it to the finals.

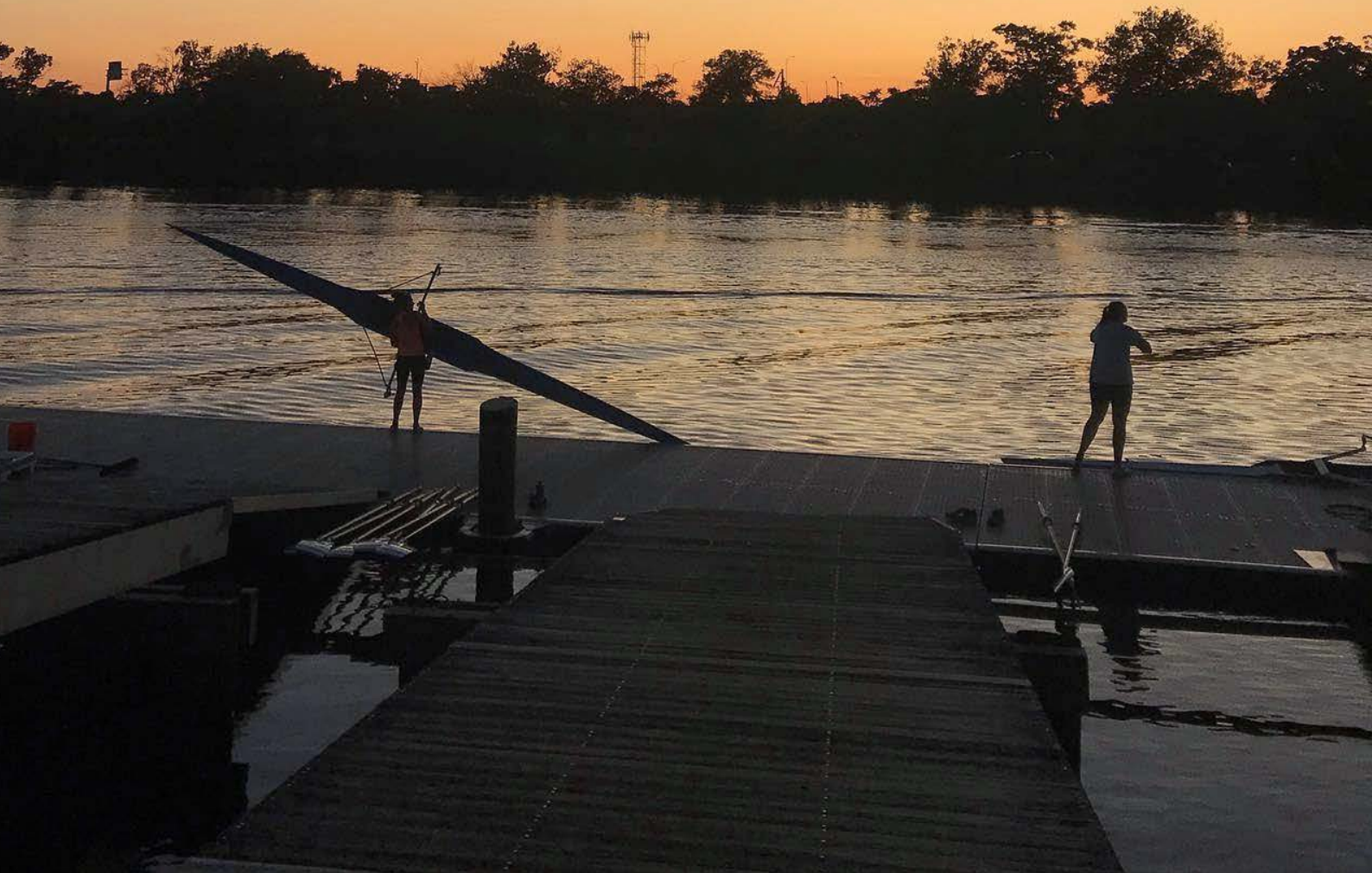
Although we stormed through the HOKs, the fall season ended rather unfortunately for the Meatwagon. A collision with BU under Weeks Bridge slowed down our A entry in the Men's Club 8+ event, and the one-minute penalty added insult to injury (dropping from 14th to 29th). It was our first time having a second entry in the Club 8+, which placed 20th, just missing out on the guaranteed spot. Although our club 8+ dominance streak ended, we are still proud that we had such a large presence with our two Men's Club 8+, two Men's Club 4+ (18th and 26th) and a LWT Men's 4+ (8th).



SCULLING

In 2019, Riverside scullers once proved their mettle, guided by the all-star coaching triumvirate of Liane Keister, Lauren Ayers, and Jessica Smith. The coached sessions, which we at Riverside are so fortunate to have, offered an opportunity for scullers to hone their skills, to obtain extra motivation for piece work, and to bond overall as a group.

The racing season began in June with a solid Riverside showing at the Derby Sweeps and Sculls, a straight 1,000 meters up the Housatonic. Notable performances came from Sarah Cuddy and Carrie Main who took 1st in the both the Women's Open 2X and the Women's Masters 2X, Sean Wolf who won the Men's Masters 1X over various unfortunate smart kids, and the tandem of Janice Hayes-Cha and Anita Verheul, who claimed 2nd in the Women's Masters 2X.



July means Cromwell Cup. This year, per usual, Riverside had a number of impressive performances. First place finishes went to Carrie Main in the Women's Masters A-G1X, the legendary Nik Kurmakov in the Men's Masters A-G1X, Ilana Zieff and Dani DeWitt in the Women's Masters 2X, and Andrew MacMillen, who claimed the cash prize for fastest Men's 1X of the day. Second place honors went to Anita Verheul in the Women's Masters A-G 1X, John Tracey in the Men's Masters A-G 1X, and Sarah Cuddy and Carrie Main in the Women's Masters 2X.

In August, a contingent of scullers headed north to St. Catharines, Ontario to compete at Canley Masters. In the Womens C 1X, it was Carrie Main finishing in 3rd. In the Men's E 2X, it was Nikolay Kurmakov and Sean Wolf claiming 3rd. Carrie and Nik would also take 4th in the Mixed E-I 2X.

Come September, World Rowing Masters gathered on the warm waters of Lake Velence, Hungary, where John Tracey nabbed silver in both the Men's Masters E 1X and the Men's Masters E 2X, the latter in a composite boat. Catherine Widgery, unable to race in her sculling events due to illness, did not return home empty-handed, picking up gold in the Women's F 8+.



Fall is all about apples, syrup and cheese sandwiches in Putney, VT, home of the Green Mountain Head Regatta, a 3-mile stake race, reminiscent of the 19th century Biglin brothers' events. The vibe is rustic and low-key, which on the surface appears casual and perhaps serves a disarming function. However, this race is big, featuring many of the sport's elite athletes sizing up their competition for the Charles held just three weeks later. Notable Singles finishes this year include Alex Twist placing 12th in Men's 19-34, Mike Farry claiming 1st in Men's 35-44, Ava Dargon winning Women's <19 in her first season wearing stripes, Jen Sacchetti claiming third in Women's 35-44, and Catherine Widgery taking 2nd in the Women's 65-74 race. In the Women's Open Doubles, Jillian Zieff and Hillary Saeger placed 2nd to Gevie Stone and Cicely Madden as Makayla Karr-Warner and Liz Martin earned 3rd. In the Men's Open Doubles, Josh Bilchik and Mats Terwiesch grabbed 4th place. In Master's 2X events, Meghan Brundage and Melissa Hilton (Vesper BC) won the Women's 2X Masters 80+ and Ilana Zieff and Bob Mannino (Union BC) won the Mixed 2X Masters 80+.

October racing opened with the Textile Regatta, where both clubs and schools compete on the 6K course along the Merrimack River in Lowell. On a balmy fall day, Tricia Carney took a decisive 1st place in the Women's Grand Masters 1X. In a tight race, Andy O'Brien claimed 2nd place in the Men's Grand Masters 1X. Sean Wolf won 1st in the Men's Senior Masters 1X and Chris Dyke secured 2nd in the Men's Masters 1X.

At the 55th Head of the Charles, Riverside once again earned numerous honors. Catherine Widgery impressively defended her title in the Women's Veterans II Singles. In the Master Doubles, the Men's event saw Mike Farry and Vesper oarsman Greg Kaplan take 1st place in a composite boat and Sean Wolf and Pete Morelli grab 2nd, whereas in the Women's event, Tina Vandersteel and Alexis Sneff Belakovskiy claimed 2nd. In the Women's Master Singles, Alexandra Bailey finished strong in 7th. The Men's Championship Doubles saw Joe Hanna and Sam Hausmann take 8th. In the Women's Championship Doubles, Hillary Saeger and Jillian Zieff snatched 3rd, moving up a place from 2018, while Makayla Karr-Warner and Liz Martin grabbed 7th. In the Men's Lightweight Singles, Alex Twist took 5th place. In the Women's Club Singles, Ilana Zieff took 5th place, and in the Men's Club Singles, Graeme Calloway picked up 8th. In the Director's Challenge Mixed Doubles, Christine Cavallo and Sean Wolf earned 2nd and in the Director's Challenge Men's Quad, John Tracey took 9th place in a composite boat.



All in all, 2019 was another highly successful year for Riverside sculling. With impressive depth of talent in nearly all age brackets and top-notch coaching, sculling at Riverside remains quite strong.



DEVELOPMENT REPORT

Riverside's aspirations for renovating and expanding our boathouse entail design, financing and permitting challenges that will take multiple years to realize. As we work on those plans, the aging of our 1912 boathouse continues and there are safety and operational concerns to be addressed now. Our current approach dovetails with investment in our existing facility, which is expected to remain and be honored by what comes next.

The next phase of our vision include meeting with the new DCR Commissioner and collaborating with Simmons and BC High on a feasibility study.

Major renovations projects on our existing structure in 2019 included new porch railings, a complete rebuild of the lower and upper decks, redesign of the oar cabinets, and a new fire escape. We added new energy-efficient lighting to the outside of the boathouse and a new doubles bay roll-up steel door.
